From the Principal's Desk

This is what I shared at our recent ANZAC Assembly.

Welcome to our ANZAC Assembly. We are honoured to have our special guests from the RSA. Thank you for joining us today.



On Sunday 11 November 2018, I went to the Auckland Domain with Mrs Thomas and our then 16 year old son; where we were met by a truly staggering sight -18,277 white, named crosses. There was a cross for every New Zealander who died during the 1914-1918 conflict in Europe. We refer to that war - which ended 100 years previously – in a number of ways: The Great War, The War to End All Wars, but most commonly, The First World War.

Each cross remembers a real person.

Each person had hopes for a good life.

Each life was cut short.

On the day we visited the Domain, we found the crosses for the three of our children's great, great uncles who died in WW1 - one on Sally's side of the family and two on the Thomas side.

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PO Box 775 Whangaparaoa Auckland 0943 New Zealand Rifleman John (Jack) Conyngham: Died in the Somme, France, on 10 September 1918 (just one month before the war ended). He was 22 years old and before leaving New Zealand, had started his career as a teacher up north at Whangaroa. Jack had a brother who also served in Europe. Trooper Alfred Edward Thomas died in 1915 from wounds received at Gallipoli. He was 26. He had worked in the agricultural sector in the Taranaki.

Lieutenant William Alfred Thomas died in 1917 in Rouen, France. He was 40 years old, married with six children. William had fought in the Boer War about 16 years earlier.



My great-uncles were two of five boys from the same family who went to that war.

- One being my grandfather, Frank, who was wounded but able to return and start a family. Unfortunately, he died in 1938 after struggling for two decades from WW1 injuries and sicknesses.
- My great-uncle Arthur came back from the war with shell shock, shrapnel wounds and dysentery. He actually lived to a good old age and I remember visiting him when I was a wee lad.
- The fifth of the brothers, Harold Tahana Thomas, returned from the war, started a family, went farming and lived a full life. Among other things, he wrote books and poetry, and was very involved with Rotary internationally.

Family members were allowed to take the crosses after a week or so. On the appointed day, I was at the Domain before dawn. Having found the crosses of Jack, Alfred and William. I was on my way back to my car and remember saying something like, "C'mon boys, let's get you home." Then I just stopped and cried. It was a very sobering experience.

18,277 New Zealand lives were lost in The War to End All Wars. And we did not learn, and we have not learnt. There has been a war of some kind, somewhere in the world, continuously since WW1. What will it take? That's where we all have a part to play. Hopefully, our lives show that hate, prejudice, and intolerance have no place in a civil society. We can make the world a better place.

And when there is hatred, prejudice and intolerance, we must be prepared to step up – as these three did – even if the cost is great.

This is why we remember. Lest we forget. 1 Deamer



Year 8 - HPV1 on 20 May 2021, HPV2 on 15 November 2021

Year 7 - Boostrix on 19 August 2021

As part of the national immunisation schedule, all Year 8 learners will be offered the opportunity to be immunised at school against the HPV virus.

Information and a consent form have been sent home with your child. Learners have been shown an information video in class.

All Year 7 learners will be offered the opportunity to receive Boostrix (tetanus, diphtheria and whooping cough).

Year 7 learners have also been shown a video in class and consent forms have been sent home.

Please complete the form and return it to your childs Kaiārahi.

It is important that the form is completed whether or not you give consent.

If they have already received the immunisation, or you wish to take them to your family practice for the free immunisations, please complete Part B, the Non-Consent part of the form.
