## From the Principal's Desk

Occasionally we come across a story that is simply inspirational and gives us real hope about the good that exists in our world.



Spanish runner Ivan Fernandez Anaya is still receiving attention for a race he lost in December 2012. Here's why, as told by Spanish newspaper *El Pais*:

Fernandez Anaya was running second, some distance behind race leader Abel Mutai -- bronze medalist in the 3,000 meter steeplechase at the London Olympics. As they entered the finishing straight, he saw the Kenyan runner – the certain winner of the race – mistakenly pull up about 10 meters before the finish, thinking he had already crossed the line.

Fernandez Anaya quickly caught up with him, but instead of exploiting Mutai's mistake to speed past and claim an unlikely victory, he stayed behind and, using gestures, guided the Kenyan to the line and let him cross first.

Tough decision, right? Actually, no. "He was the rightful winner," Fernandez Anaya said. "He created a gap that I couldn't have closed if he hadn't made a mistake. As soon as I saw he was stopping, I knew I wasn't going to pass him."


# L2 Sociology

"On Monday 10 May we, as well as many other school students, attended the World Vision Youth Conference. At this conference we were spoken to by two main guests, Yoseph Ayele and Lydia Hollister-Jones, as well as the host, Laz Lemantau. Yoseph worked with the NZ government to co -design and implement the Global Impact Visa, and Lydia is known to work with human-trafficking survivors in Cambodia. Other notable members of World Vision also appeared and spoke, such as Kiwi singer Paige Tapara and Jess Quinn.

They spoke about the issues that face our world and how these problems are not being worked on enough towards solving. They demonstrated this once through an activity with pegs. Each of the pegs at first represented a food item, however, once all pegs were collected, they were instead labelled as a basic need for human survival.


A work placement isn't easy to complete on site with these providers, so we made arrangements for them to join us at the College for a question/answer session.

We were able to explore the Seamanship Training Establishment and view the warehouse storage facility which provides the Navy and its ships with essential items. The staff at the RNZN Bridge Simulator Facility were fantastic. The facility includes three mock-up ship bridges used to teach ship handling and navigation practices. We were split into three teams and a battle was had, with three ships

competing for first place while dodging obstacles and navigating the ocean. So much fun.
